Owner Tina Archuleta (Jemez) is a social entrepreneur, community doula, chef, and mother. Her life's work has always centered around reclamation of wellness in Native communities.

Growing up in Jemez Pueblo, along with other Pueblos around the state, Archuleta said oftentimes the only places to get food nearby are area gas stations, which don't provide healthy food options. Driving to a grocery store could be a daylong trek. These types of foods only exacerbate high obesity and diabetes rates among Native Americans, she added, inspiring her to create an alternative.

After receiving a number of debt equity and grants, she started as a catering business, delivering juices, salads, wraps, fruit cups, and smoothies to pueblos and convenience stores near pueblos and the Navajo Nation. She also had booths at the Railyards Market and at feast days across the pueblos. Now, Archuleta is bringing her concept to a brick-and-mortar, grab-and-go location.

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“My multifaceted skillset, along with being a Natural Therapeutic Specialist, is manifesting into Itality Plant Based Foods,” Archuleta said. “Food justice and the shift in community food ways place me on the front lines of a battle to heal and educate through sustenance.

“I’m especially about opening at Avanyu Plaza, which is owned by the 19 Pueblos of New Mexico, and even more so about opening on Indigenous Peoples Day.”

Archuleta’s store is located just west of IPCC’s newest eatery, 12<sup>th</sup> Street Tavern. She joins the already-open Bureau of Indian Affairs, Holiday Inn Express, Marriott TownePlace Suites, Starbucks, Laguna Burger, Sixty-Six Acres, Rude Boy Cookies, Domino’s, and U.S. Eagle Federal Credit Union. Upcoming openings include La Montañita Food Co-op and the IMPI-owned Rainwater Wellness, according to IPCC President/CEO Mike Canfield.


