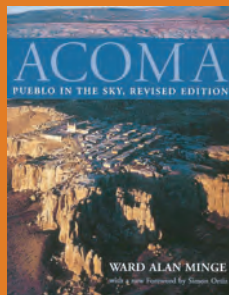

Enjoy a one-of-a-kind, contemporary Indigenous meal in our beautiful Silver & Turquoise Room. This multi-course dinner will feature Indigenous cuisine curated and prepared by Chef M. Karlos Baca (Tewa/Diné/Nuchu), an Indigenous foods activist from the Southern Ute Nation and Founder

of Taste of Native Cuisine, an Indigenous food cooperative based out of the Southern Ute territory in southwestern Colorado.

Learn about the cultural inspiration for the meal and wine pairing and experience a flute performance by Flutist Adrian Wall (Jemez). The Yellowbird Indian Dancers (Apache) will also perform a hoop dance. Proceeds benefit scholarships for Pueblo members who want to advance their careers through continued education.

Representing two Pueblo communities, Cliff Fragua (Jemez) and Anthony Romero (Cochiti) are sculptors of stone who will be bringing their unique art for display at IPCC. The exhibition will be comprised of sculptures made in various shapes and types of stone—each exemplifying the technique and style of the artists.

Join us for the opening reception on January 28th from 5-7:00PM in the Artists Circle Gallery. It is open to the public, free for members or with museum admission. On March 12, come and meet the artists at a special presentation as they discuss their creative process and the inspiration for their work. The exhibition runs through May 20, 2022.
