



3 Pay honor.

Native people have long answered our nation's call through military service. On Friday, Veterans Day, the **Indian Pueblo Cultural Center**, in Albuquerque, hosts a posting of the colors, art market, and performances by the Oak Canyon Dance Group from Jemez Pueblo from 9 a.m. to noon. "Every year, we honor veterans and their sacrifices," says Jon Ghaheir (Laguna and Zuni). The center's cultural educator, Ghaheir is also a veteran. "On Friday, veterans will also be able to share their stories as we recognize those who have served and currently serve in the armed forces."
